Description:

Most students are familiar with *The Chronicles of Narnia*, but this course will take us to a deeper study of all things Narnia. No one outgrows *The Chronicles of Narnia*, and high school is the perfect time to revisit them.

Students will learn through the Socratic question-and-answer method as we engage in discussions during our class time. Students will take tests on literary terms, chapter content, and answer short essay questions.

Prerequisites:

Students should be at an 8th-grade level in literature and grammar.

Students will be provided with short paragraphs to practice paraphrasing and given story prompts to write creative short stories. These activities will build their writing skills and confidence.

In preparation for their final project, students will review an expository essay of *The Chronicles of Narnia* and compose an essay drawing their own conclusions.
