Personal Note from Instructor:

Upon successful completion of this course, students will:

- Be able to identify the five key elements of a novel (narration, setting, characters, plot, and theme).
- Appreciate quality Christian literature and be able to explain what they've read.
- · Improve their reading comprehension and vocabulary.
- Be able to identify and think critically about a story's morals and apply the biblical lessons to their daily lives.

NOTE: The instructor does not require attendance of the live lectures but highly recommends students attend as many of the live lectures as possible to take advantage of live Q&A. Lectures are recorded and posted on the course Canvas page under the associated week and module. If you miss a lecture, please watch the recording. You can also use the recording for review as you prepare for the online exam.

Description:

In this course, students will read seven books by Lamplighter Ministries that will help to build character and strengthen their relationship with



Christ. We will spend 4-5 weeks reading and studying each book. Students will answer discussion questions, which will help them to think critically about story elements such as characters, plots, and themes. Along with the discussion questions, students will also read and memorize portions of Scripture and engage in guided biblical studies as they pertain to the Christian themes woven throughout each book. At the end of each book study, students will be required to write a short 500-750 word essay, summarizing one of the book's main biblical themes and how they can practically apply those truths to their own lives. To conclude each semester, students will take an exam

that will quiz their knowledge of the books studied (two exams for the year).

- Bible (we will be using the NKJV in class)

Course Topics:

Evangelism, honesty, honoring parents, God's sovereignty, fighting/killing sin, modesty, etc.



Assignment Structure:

Depending on the book, you will have approximately 5 chapters to read each week, with the chapters varying in length. I recommend completing one or more chapters each day, along with the corresponding study guide. Each study guide will include discussion questions, definitions, and a Bible lesson. During the last week of studying each book, you will write a short 500 word essay in proper format (introduction, body, and conclusion which will be discussed further in class). If you devote a little time each day to this class and submit your assignments on time, you'll do well!

Grading:

Weekly Study Guides - 50% of final grade

Essays, one per book (7 total) - 35% of final grade

Exams, one per semester (2 total)- 15% of final grade

Due Dates and Late Policy:

All due dates are labeled on the course calendar found on your Canvas Course page. Students will be reminded of due dates at the beginning of each lecture. Students are responsible for keeping track of all scheduled due dates and are responsible for any changes announced during lecture and/or on Canvas. The instructor reserves the right to change due dates at any time, but must give students notice at least one week prior. All assignments (study guides, essays, and exams,) need to be turned in before starting a new week in class.

All deadlines are **Saturday 11:59pm eastern time (ET)**. A late penalty of 5% will be applied every day an assignment is late unless an extension request is submitted by a parent or guardian.

I will only consider extensions if requested by <u>parents or guardians</u> via email for situations beyond the student's control. If the extension is approved, all late penalties will be waived.
